Patient retention for a new dental owner



Buying a dental practice is an exciting step; however, if you have not been the associate there and are going to start meeting patients after the sale, patient retention is a big deal. Especially since

"good will" is the most expensive part of a dental practice purchase price.

When a dentist decides to sell his practice, it can be challenging for the new owner. Common concerns that patients may have when their dentist retires include continuity of care, trust and familiarity, access to records, changes in practice policies, and financial implications. Patients may be concerned about the continuity of their dental care and wonder if the new dentist will provide the same level of expertise and quality of care as the retiring dentist.

Patients have built a trusting relationship with their retiring dentist over the years and may be concerned about establishing a new relationship with a different dentist. They also may be worried about the transfer of their dental records to the new dentist or practice, and want to ensure that their dental history, treatment plans, and any ongoing issues are properly communicated to the new dentist. When a practice changes hands, there may be changes in practice policies. It is important to provide reassurance that the new dentist will

maintain the same standards and practices they are accustomed to. Patients may wonder if there will be any changes in fees, insurance coverage, or payment options with the new dentist. I believe it is important to make changes slowly to not shock patients and allow them to get used to all the changes that are to come.

Some ways to improve patient retention include communication, excellent service, incentives, introductions and staying in touch. Being honest with patients about the reasons for sale, and any changes that may occur in the practice, makes patients feel comfortable and involved in the transition. Communicating with patients about changes in a clear way lets them know that the dentist is retiring and introduces them to the new dentist who will be taking over the practice.

Informing patients in advance and as soon as possible is the most important part! A well-written letter informing the patients about the change in ownership is a great first step. Patients are more likely to stay with a practice if they receive high-quality care and customer service. Make sure that the office staff as well as dentists are well-trained and have good bedside manner. Consider offering incentives to patients who stay with the practice after the retiring dentist leaves.

Introducing the new dentist is important. Patients may be more likely to stay with the

practice if they feel comfortable with the new dentist. The retiring or selling doctor should personally introduce the new dentist to patients and give them peace of mind that they are in good hands. Keeping in touch with patients through newsletters, social media, or other means can help to build a sense of community and loyalty among patients.

By following these strategies, a dentist can help ensure a smooth transition and patient retention for the new dentist taking over.

Addressing patients' concerns and providing clear communication will alleviate any anxieties that patients may have. When you address these concerns proactively, the transition can be smoother, and patients can feel more confident in continuing their dental care with the new dentist.

Digitizing Dentistry

Artificial Intelligence (AI) has emerged as a transformative force in various industries, and dentistry is no exception. With the advancement of AI technologies, dentists are experiencing a profound impact on their practices, patient care and overall efficiency. Let's face it. Whether we like it or not, the advent of digitizing dentistry is here, and we all need to embrace it. Here are a few highlights on the influence of AI on dentists, applications, benefits and potential challenges.

With the advancement of Al technologies, dentists are experiencing a profound impact on their practices, patient care and overall efficiency.

Arguably the most significant impact of AI in dentistry is in diagnostics and imaging. AI-powered software such as Pearl AITM can analyze dental X-rays, scans, and images with exceptional precision, aiding dentists in detecting dental issues early on. We see ads on this commonly pop up every day, as these systems can quickly identify cavities, bone loss and other abnormalities, leading to more accurate diagnoses. Will this replace a dentist's knowledge and expertise? I don't believe it is a better alternative, but I do believe AI empowers dentists to provide timely and effective treatment plans, thereby improving patient outcomes.

Al-integrated dental equipment and robotics such as Yomi™ are transforming the way procedures are performed. Robotic systems can assist dentists during complex surgeries, enabling more precise movements and reducing the margin of error. SprintRay™ has helped dentists in the design and fabrication of crowns and nightguards using Al, cutting the time it takes to design these cases. What used to take 30 minutes to design, can now be done in 5 minutes with minimal adjustments.

While AI presents numerous benefits, dentists should also be aware of potential challenges. Data privacy and security concerns arise as AI systems handle sensitive patient information. Ensuring that patient data is adequately protected becomes crucial to maintain patient trust. Moreover, some dentists may be hesitant to adopt AI technologies due to concerns about the replacement of human expertise. However, AI should be viewed as a powerful tool that complements and augments dental practices rather than a replacement for skilled professionals.

It is indeed a wonderful time to be a young and budding dentist! Advances in Al-driven diagnostics, robotics, and fabrication will lead to an extremely efficient workflow, and we must embrace the future. If you asked me 10 years ago

when I entered dental school if I'd imagine my career to be futuristic in nature, I'd say no. To be completely honest, I still take traditional PVS impressions and I still use my WhipMix articulator. However, I do believe the way I've practiced 5 years ago has completely changed. Change is good, and change

General Membership Meeting - September 2023 The Many Faces of Orofacial Pain: Beyond TMD

STEVEN D. BENDER, DDS



Dr. Bender is a 1986 graduate of Baylor College of Dentistry and studied orofacial pain at the University of Florida College of Dentistry. He is currently a Clinical Associate Professor in the department of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery, Texas A&M College of Dentistry in Dallas Texas and serves as the director of the Clinical Center for Facial Pain and Sleep Medicine, Texas A&M Health, Dallas, TX. He is a Diplomate of the American Board of Orofacial Pain and has earned Fellowships in the American Academy of Orofacial Pain, the American Headache Society, the International Academy of Oral Oncology and the American College of Dentists.

The number one reason patients seek care from their health care providers is for pain. In the dental practice, when pathology is not easily identifiable, the diagnosis becomes more difficult often leading to well intentioned but misguided therapies. Therefore, it is important for clinicians to be able to identify the various presentations of nonodontogenic pains in the face and oral cavity. This presentation is designed to help the dental team become confident with the diagnosis of some of the more common nonodontogenic orofacial pain complaints encountered in the dental practice. Strategies for the management of these disorders as well as determining when referral is recommended will also be discussed.

McWhorter surprised with named endowment

r. Alton McWhorter, clinical professor and department head of pediatrics at Texas A&M School of Dentistry, is known for his compassionate care for patients. Only the third pediatric department chair in the school's history, he is well regarded by colleagues, students and patients. This legacy of care and excellence will now grow to help even more people, thanks to a brand-new endowment in his name.

"Dr. McWhorter was – and still is – championing our department," said Dr. Carolyn Kerins, a faculty member who aided in fundraising for the endowment. "This is a great way to honor his years of service to teaching and providing care to pediatric and special needs patients."

The endowment was a surprise to McWhorter. Kerins had been planning to fundraise for the department for a while, she said, and earlier this year decided to do so in McWhorter's name. She and Ian Wilson, director of development with the Texas A&M Foundation, quietly reached out to a select group of alumni over the spring. Wilson said that everyone was generous and eager to contribute, quickly raising \$250,000. They surprised McWhorter with news of the endowment's creation in May at the annual American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry Conference.

"I knew she was fundraising, but I had no idea she was doing it under my name," McWhorter said. "That was a big surprise. I don't think it's quite sunk in yet; it's kind of funny. It's such an unbelievable honor."

The endowment will be used to provide care for pediatric and special needs patients who otherwise cannot afford proper dental care. Wilson explained the money raised will be invested by the Texas A&M Foundation, and the returns on the investment will be used to help cover the cost of treatments. As more money is raised and the investments grow, more people will receive care thanks to the endowment.

"The cool thing about an endowment is that it lasts in perpetuity, meaning it'll outlive us," Wilson said. "With Dr. McWhorter's endowment, we're really helping pediatric families that don't

have the resources to pay for their kids' dental needs. This is something that Dr. McWhorter cares about immensely. It's high time that we honor this man; he's been here for 36 years. He's a staple within the school and one of our most beloved faculty members."

Another round of fundraising was planned for the summer. Although there is no set goal, they hope to hit a total of \$500,000 raised.

In addition to covering pediatric care, Kerins said the legacy fund will also offer more training opportunities for residents.

McWhorter said his passion for pediatric care grew over time. He practiced general dentistry for a few years after graduating and naturally began to evaluate his favorite aspects of the job. Eventually, the scope of what he enjoyed most narrowed to pediatric care, so he "bit the bullet" and went back to school to specialize. Part of what he really enjoys about his specialization is giving kids a good impression of going to the dentist and setting them up for good dental experiences in the future.

"We get to do all of the things in general dentistry for the most part - fillings, extractions, that sort of thing - but the smaller patients can be trickier to work with," McWhorter said. "It's just an easy transition from us to a general dentist. We've trained them to be good patients, they've had good experiences prior to that, and they can go on and be a good patient for someone else."
