Does your office have no shows and cancellations?



hen patients continue to cancel and no show, it prevents offices from having full schedules. According to Becker's Dental Review (7/25, Portalatin), "Patient no-shows and cancellations

continue to be the largest barrier preventing dental practice schedules from reaching full capacity this year." Also, the ADA did a survey and found out that, "dental practice appointment schedules have remained largely unchanged month over month this year, reaching 88 percent fullness in June." The reason schedules were not 100% at capacity was due to patient no-shows and cancellations less than 24 hours before.

How do these no shows and cancellations affect practice productivity? According to, Manny Chopra, DMD from the Center for Dental Health (Cincinnati), "These cancellations have resulted in decreased productivity as appointment slots go unfilled." So, the question is, how do we overcome these issues and reduce no shows and unfilled slots?

Dental offices should implement patient reminder systems, take deposit for appointments longer than sixty minutes, charge a fee for missed and cancelled appointments less than 24 hours, and train staff on better communication with patients to encourage their dental appointment attendance. If we make it difficult for patients to reschedule, showing the importance of keeping their scheduled appointments, we are more likely for patients to respect our time and show up for their dental visit!

The reminder system my office is currently using is Weave; it integrates well with Dentrix and makes patient communication and reminders a breeze. This system allows patients to prefill out forms and health history updates from a text message link and auto integrates into their dental electronic chart. As wonderful as this software is, I am still seeing last-minute cancellations and no shows even with implementing it. However, Weave has allowed our office to be more efficient!

Another problem with schedules not at full capacity is that staff are bored, which lowers

Hiring for dental team openings: One of today's biggest challenges in practice management

In the dynamic world of dentistry, assembling the right team is essential for providing exceptional patient care and maintaining a thriving practice. Whether you're a solo practitioner or overseeing a group practice, finding the perfect fit for your dental team openings requires careful consideration and strategic hiring practices.

In the last few years, navigating staff turnover in the private practice setting has become something that comes close to impossible. they will flourish and also be content. There may even be times that you hire someone for one position, and you end up moving them to a completely different one later as they develop their skills or show more promise with another role in the team.

It helps to leverage multiple channels to advertise your job openings. While traditional methods like online dental job boards and dental recruiting agencies remain valuable, don't overlook the power of other professional platforms and social media. Utilize professional networking sites like LinkedIn to connect with potential candidates and showcase your practice's culture and values. Be very specific about what you are looking for in a team member for the position and filter out those that do not meet the requirements—for the sake of not wasting anyone's time.

When reviewing applications and resumes, look beyond technical skills and experience. Consider the candidate's attitude, communication skills, and compatibility with your practice's culture. A positive attitude, strong work ethic, and genuine passion for patient care can often outweigh lack of experience, as these qualities are more difficult to teach. Be sure to conduct thorough interviews to assess candidates' suitability for the role and your team. Ask insightful questions that reveal their problem-solving abilities, interpersonal skills, and alignment with your practice's mission and values. Additionally, consider conducting working interviews or shadowing experiences to evaluate candidates' skills in a real-world setting. As we all know, communication is key, and clear communication about expectations can go a long way. Make sure you understand what they are looking for in an office and what is important to them. You also want to make your expectations clear to ensure they feel comfortable meeting those needs.

Last but not least, as a dental employer, it's crucial to create an environment that fosters both professional growth and personal well-being for your staff. Offering reasonable hours can accommodate the diverse needs of your team, promoting work-life balance and reducing burnout. 

The Importance of Oral Pathology

Ensuring the optimal oral health and well-being of your patients



s clinicians, you are professionally and medicolegally responsible for the oral health of your patients. And that includes the recognition and management of any

oral pathologic process that could adversely affect the overall health of your patients. How important is oral pathology to the practice of dentistry? No more but certainly no less important than any other discipline that contributes to the quality of care we provide our patients. The problem with oral path is that you don't use it every day and in fact, many of the most serious conditions, you rarely see. BUT, that does not relieve you of the responsibility to remain competent in this area of practice.

I was once called by the President of the State Board of Dental Examiners and asked what I thought about making one hour of CE on oral cancer mandatory for licensure. My advice was no, I did not feel we should force you to do something you have a responsibility to do anyway. I am honored again to be a speaker on oral path this year at the SWDC. I will give two half day lectures entitled "A Practical Approach to Evaluating Patients with Oral Pathology in Clinical Practice" and "A Comprehensive Review and Update of Oral Pathology for Dentists and Dental Hygienists."

I have always focused on clinical relevancy and teach in a way that improves your ability to take good care of your patients. The first lecture is as practical as it gets. The entire lecture will be case based and illustrated through differential diagnosis.

Clinical cases will be chosen to illustrate the myriad of clinical signs and symptoms that oral soft tissue pathology can produce. Additionally, we will illustrate the range of radiographic pathology and review the most common pathologic processes in bone. The second lecture will be a fast-paced review of virtually every aspect of oral pathology. I was once asked if I could summarize everything I know about oral pathology in a 3 hour lecture. I am pleased, but humbled, to admit that indeed, I can.

I have been educating predoctoral dental, dental hygiene and graduate students for over 45 years. As I reach the end of my employment, this may be the last session I will give for the SWDC. I hope to see you there.

FEAR



rom my late teens in the 1970's and through the worst of the AIDS epidemic sometime in the early 2000s, my life was filled with fear. I realized I was gay and was terrified

of going to hell, losing my family, and being expelled from dental school if discovered. I was raised in a Southern Baptist Republican family so much of this was instilled in me.

I didn't think I had ever met anyone gay and had terrible ideas about what gay people were like. I remember imagining a flasher in a raincoat standing under an overpass. In dental school I changed the pronouns of dates from "she" to "he". I took as my date a rugged looking handsome gay man to school/fraternity functions. I had a professor that was my mentor. She was very closeted and told me that when she interviewed for dental school they told her that she would be expelled if it was discovered she was a lesbian.

I saw my first AIDS patient in 1984. I had studied AIDS in school but had not seen a case to my knowledge. A new patient, a commercial airline pilot, came in saying he didn't feel well, and something was wrong with his mouth. I took one look inside his mouth and realized he had several infections associated with AIDS. I told him what I suspected, and he tested positive. He was dead in two weeks. During those two weeks, he told his friends to see Dr. Boyd because she could tell you if you had it, which wasn't entirely true.

Suddenly, I had all of these AIDS patients and I was terrified. We didn't know how it was transmitted then. I called my mentor and told her about my fears. She said, "If you don't do it, who is going to do it?" I realized she was right

Not long after that, I was disabled from a car accident and told I couldn't practice dentistry any longer. I sold my practice and went back to post-doctoral school at UTHSCSA. I studied oral medicine with an emphasis on AIDS. I began to lecture around the country. I was also fortunate

enough to get a fellowship in geriatrics that allowed me to continue my AIDS work. At the time, most dentists wouldn't see AIDS patients.

There was so much discrimination against AIDS patients that even some paramedics wouldn't transport them. Families threw AIDS-positive family members on the street. Before we had a real hospice, the dying were in an old house lined up on cots with little room to walk between them. The dying were skeletal, often covered with Kaposi sarcoma. If someone died in the middle of the night, I had to put on my hospital scrubs and long white UTHCSA coat and go to our makeshift hospice, or they would often accuse the nurses of euthanasia. Physicians wouldn't go there either.

Fortunately, several years after the car accident, I was able to practice general dentistry again. I've had a fabulous career in dentistry. I was able to organize two free dental clinics for people with HIV/AIDS, building one in San Antonio, and rebuilding the Nelson-Tebedo Clinic in Dallas. Being in my own private practice allowed me to make my own schedule, which provided time for extensive travel. Dentistry is a combination of art and science, which is perfect for me.

I'm very glad that things have changed so much that young people don't have to deal with the issues I did. It is important to remember that politics change, and things can revert to severe discrimination again as we are seeing against the misunderstood transgendered people.

Please don't let this happen!

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
